Alii Holo Kai Kumu Hunt ...

On November 19th, Sunday, 28 members and guest of the Alii Holo Kai (AHK) dive club, registered to participate in search for the largest "goat fish" on Oahu. Normally, this time of the month the water is misty, due to high surf and irregular tide change, making this event challenging. But, exceptional divers consistently know how to find large Kumu's or Moana Kali's; they know the terrain and type of fish that's in the area, and are determined to be "KH Champion" for 2006. "

The Contest

The same scenario year after year of weighing in the fish happens at the home of Frank Farm, (AHK) president. The dive starts from day break and ends at 2:00 pm followed by a party at 6:00.

Before the weigh-in, the divers sample and vote on a Poke contest. This category is optional for participation. This year's winner went to *Roy Kamisato*, displaying his Tako Poke. To me, the texture was tender, tasty, and different, the flavor was similar to that expensive Japanese shell fish that you buy and eat right out of the can, truthfully that's my opinion, "Roy, got my vote".

The weigh-in is always suspenseful and exciting, especially if you knew that you had a chance to place in a category and the deciding factor is a fraction of an ounce". 

DIVE YEAR. Again we start the new year with the traditional "TAKO HUNT". After all the merriment, and holiday feasting you probably will <u>not</u> be in top condition to stalk and try to outwit some of the more fast swimming elusive fish. So it is Tako time, all you have to do is find them and 'usually' you can capture most that you see.

This event is scheduled for Sunday January 28th, 2007. The minimum eligible octopus weight is 2 pounds and no scooping in the tako category.

Awards in 3 Tako Categories, 3 places: <u>1 Total weight</u> (largest 3 tako) 1st, 2nd, 3rtd. <u>2. Heaviest single tako:</u> 1st, 2nd, 3rd.

3. Longest Tako 1st, 2nd, 3rd.

A special award for the heaviest mystery fish caught with a 3 prong and must be one of the following: 12"minimum= any of the goats, aawa, awaawa, mu, enenui, roi, toau, uhu. 16" minimum =opelukala, horn kala, 18" minimum = All blue water fish, awa, uku, jack family.

Look carefully at the list- and as this is a fun meet you can have only 1 each of the above at the table or face a DQ in the "fish" category. After all the fish is on the table, a drawing will determine the specie and the person with the heaviest wins!

This meet is open to all interested persons – AHK and non members may join in !! This is a swim out, 3 prong meet. Start time is after sunrise Sunday and be at Frank's (3446 Pakui St.) by 2 PM. Or face DQ. Application \$15 non refundable Entry fee if registered/paid by January 22nd @ 5 PM. Otherwise the entry fee is \$20. Mail in the enclosed registration form to da Treasurer, **Terrence Takahata 5210** Likini St. #404, Honolulu Hi 96818, or drop off at Franks house. Terry Yonashiro will get the awards and food will be provided by the club at the weigh in. Mark your calendars and <u>See</u> you on Sunday January 28th.
